The American Legion and your Post are making an impact on the nation and our community. Our national leadership led the cry to fix and improve the Veteran Administration (VA) medical facilities and service. As the largest wartime veterans organization we were heard by the VA leadership and the politicians that determine VA funding when our leaders blew the whistle on VA mismanagement and fraud.

As reported in past issues, we are active locally in each of the pillars of The Legion. You can be proud that your membership dues and the funds that we raised are being used to support local youth sports, day camp for kids, veterans in distress, patriotic programs and parades.

To stay relevant and active at the national and state levels, our leaders need our continued support. The many Legion programs that are offered to our members and families are paid for in part by member dues and legacy funds. Costs for these programs have risen while our dues have been constant for a number of years. Reluctantly, member dues were increased \$5.00 by majority vote at the 2015 National Convention. At this year's state convention, the Michigan portion of your dues was also raised by \$5.00 effective 1 January 2017. This means that after the first of next year, the annual dues will be \$45.00.

We must vote to approve this last change. I sincerely hope that you will consider the impact of your dues as we continue to serve America and approve the increase.

AMERICANISM- Kalamazoo's Past War Efforts-

Throughout history, when wars are fought, the people and communities at home are affected. When the war is fought on distant lands, the people at home can influence the course of the war, though their war efforts. Kalamazoo is no exception. The following is a summary of the war effort of one Kalamazoo company and its employees, during World War II. The pharmaceutical manufacturer, the Upjohn Company, had a significant role in turning out war products during World War II. The following information is from the booklet "Now That the Full Story Can Be Told", published by the Upjohn Company.

Beginning in June 1941 with an order for 4,000 pints of extract of Cascara Sagrada, until after V-J Day, a significant percentage of Upjohn production capacity was used for the war effort. In 1941 alone, 87 different items were produced for our fighting forces. One order was received for 131,668,992 Sulfadiazine tablets. It took 15 months to complete that order, which was filled on time.

A very important product, sulfadiazine was produced as "wound tablets". Millions of these 7.7 grain tablets were made by Upjohn during the war. It was necessary to run the lines for 24 hours a day to meet demand. A plastic container was designed so a wounded person could slide the top off with one hand. Wound tablets saved thousands of lives by preventing infection.



Upjohn scientists participated in the basic research work in Penicillin in cooperation with other pharmaceutical and government scientists. Penicillin was ready for production in 1943 and Upjohn was one of the first facilities that was able to make and deliver satisfactory material in significant amounts. More than 7.7 million flasks of penicillin were grown at the facility. The contents of 12 flasks were required to make one vial of penicillin and one patient may require up to 20 vials, so it can be seen how large of a production effort was needed.

Upjohn also developed Gelfoam during World War II. Made from beef bone gelatin, Gelfoam is sponge-like material which, when used during surgery, absorbs many times its volume in fluid and is then absorbed by body tissues.

Among the chemical products made in Kalamazoo was "chemical pellets". Over 800,000 pounds of them were made. The pellets were used in ordinance to help eliminate the flash of guns after dark. Upjohn machine shops even turned out precision airplane parts on sub-contracts.

In recognition of the important role Upjohn played in war production, the War Department conferred the Army-Navy Production Award upon the employees of Upjohn.

We can all take pride in the contributions our local employers made in fighting the good fight.

HANK LEMMEN- Hank was born August 9, 1922 in Kalamazoo. He served in the U.S. Air Force, as a bomber pilot during World War II, an instructor during the Korean War and was honorably discharged as a Lt. Colonel. Hank worked for over 40 years as an accountant at Allied Paper. He is survived by his wife Marian.

JAMES SYTSMA- James was born on August 9, 1922 in Kalamazoo. He was drafted into the US Army in 1942 and was one of the first servicemen stationed at Los Alamos, NM, assisting on the Manhattan Project until 1945. Upon returning home, James worked as the 4th generation baker at Sytsma's Bakery in Kalamazoo. James is survived by his wife Florence, and their family. James was the last member of the American Legion Post 36 WWII Last Mans Club.

MERRILL BRINK- Merrill was born on October 5, 1923 in Kalamazoo. He served in the U.S. Navy in WW II, the Korean War and during the Vietnam War. He retired as a Lt. Commander. Merrill worked at National Water Lift and as a real estate agent for many years until his retirement. He is survived by his wife Sandy, and their family.
